## UPDATE : Hands of Peace Restoration & Replacement Project

For and on behalf of Gail Harrower, Chairperson I (Vern Zink) am preparing this report mainly on the more technical aspects of the project. Member Chris Wells, and Chris Bauer, PE – Structural Engineer (an advisory member only) and myself are the subcommittee working on the more technical aspects of the project, i.e. the design, pattern, casting, production, finishing, site and base preparation, and installation of the monument. We report to the full committee.

Alternative foundries and fabricators have been investigated and we have interviewed principals and production people to ascertain their capacity and previous work experience. Considering proximity to the site as a factor for accessibility and the responses to our stated goals', we have concluded that the originally proposed production companies are capable and acceptable for this project. Some site visits have been made and more are planned as the project progresses.

The project has been well received by Keystone Pattern and Matrix Industries. Their enthusiasm for the project was apparent and sincere. Once the project is funded, the detailed CAD (computer-aided design) renderings for the pattern makers will first be reviewed by the Committee and the Artist, Barry Burdeny (the original and now world renowned) for conformity of aesthetics and imagery.

The aforementioned meetings have resulted in confirming that

the original quotes are being adhered to for the phases of the project through this year and the first portion of 2013. Some adjustment may be necessary if the project is delayed much further into the future. Considering ancillary project costs, the final estimate and budget are now before the committee.

Some small amounts of contributions have begun to trickle in.

Also, some local governmental units and corporate entities have been approached to budget for donations to this project. Inasmuch that this project is to be funded entirely by donations, no work orders or contracts can be executed until the project is fully funded. We feel that the technical and productions aspects have been sufficiently established to this point. There are stated 'lead times' these companies have given us – i.e. at present 20 weeks minimum.

Chairperson Gail Harrower is working with the technical people to get a web site up and it will be accessible shortly. A brochure detailing the project has been printed and distributed. It is important in that it has all the information for donors in the United States and Canada to remit their contributions and to receive their tax deductible receipts.

A mini replica of the sculpture was produced for the 1975 dedication ceremony. Quotes are being obtained to have this produced again, which collectors may purchase or which may possibly be given for larger donations. Linda Agre, incoming Region 7 President has incorporated a fundraiser, a report, etc., into the Region 7 Rally in Spicer, Minnesota. The committee has been active. With this backing, fundraising can begin with a substantive foundation for marketing.

## Michael Baron 1923—2012

Michael Baron passed away June 14, 2012 at his residence at the Irene Baron Eden Center in Winnipeg, a care facility he built and named after his late wife. Michael was a member of the Manitoba unit and transferred his membership to North Dakota in 2009. Michael joined the Air Force during World War II and trained as a pilot, but served as a chef. He worked for CN Rail for 45 years and during this time entered into the care home business. He donated his WWII link trainer, still in flying condition, to the Canadian Navy Museum to be on display at the HMCS Shearwater in Nova Scotia. He was an avid birder and lover of animals and enjoyed hobbies such as aviation, sailing, canine training and cooking. His wife Irene and daughter Colleen preceded him in death. He is survived two grandsons and two great grandchildren. A memorial in Michael and Irene Baron's name has made to the Hands of Peace Restoration Fund at the International Peace Gardens.
